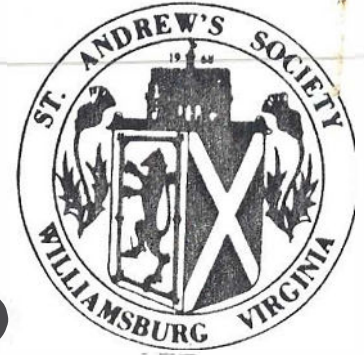




VIRGINIA HIGHLANDER
